Cemetery Business Analysis Project

Earlier this year, the City of Austin's Parks and Recreation Department (PARD) hired Dr. Thomas Longoria, Associate Professor of Political Science, of Texas State University - San Marcos to conduct a comprehensive business analysis of the City's practices for managing cemeteries. The project scope includes a stakeholder input process and a review and analysis of current industry practices and standards for municipally-owned cemeteries across the country. The findings are being compared and contrasted with the practices used by the City of Austin (COA). The review of the COA-managed cemeteries also includes an assessment of current cemetery assets, service capacity and funding, management and operations, and an overview of input from stakeholders.

The project started in February 2010. A public forum was held on June 17th, which was attended by several members of Save Austin's Cemeteries. The project is scheduled to conclude with a comprehensive final report at the end of August 2010.

The expected outcome will be the recommendation of strategic business solutions and specific service-level options for future Council consideration. The scope will also include a commentary on the role and responsibility of municipalities in managing cemeteries. Dr. Thomas Longoria will serve as the principal researcher. His areas of specialization include urban and ethnic politics, urban administration, and non-profit administration.

You may be wondering now about the current management practices, and what the City has tried in the past. In brief . . . the City, through the Public Works Department, began operating cemeteries in 1856 with the acquisition of Oakwood Cemetery located in central east Austin. The city currently owns five cemetery properties (Oakwood, Oakwood Annex, Evergreen, Plummers, and Austin Memorial Park). Cemetery operations were assigned to PARD in 1987. In 1990, following three consecutive years of revenue shortfall, the department outsourced the day-to-day funeral services and related operations to InterCare Corporation. InterCare continues to serve as the City's cemetery management contractor.

In our next newsletter, we plan to bring you the long-awaited results of the Cemetery Business Analysis project.

Cemetery Preservation

The following item was provided to us by Anne Shelton from the Texas Historical Commission. The cemetery preservation program of the Texas Historical Commission (THC) offers two programs to assist volunteers: the Historic Texas Cemetery designation and the RIP (Record, Investigate, Protect) Guardian program. Participation in both programs can have a long-term positive impact on the preservation of any historic cemetery in Texas.

Many cemeteries across the state are in perilous situations and may face endangerment due to a variety of threat. The Historic Texas Cemetery designation is the first step to preserve and record these sites. The designation records historic cemeteries in the county deed record and is the official recognition from the Texas Historical Commission. Even cemeteries fortunate enough not to face similar threats benefit from the designation. By completing the designation process, applicants build a relationship with their county historical commission as well as cemetery preservation staff and raise awareness for the cemetery and local preservation efforts. Of the five Save Austin's Cemeteries, two have been designated as a Historic Texas Cemetery: Austin Memorial Park and Oakwood.

Folks interested in continued involvement with the cemetery opt to participate in the RIP Guardian program. RIP Guardians are the statewide network of cemetery preservation volunteers who receive technical assistance and training from the THC. Participants have the opportunity to build a preservation plan for the historic cemetery and help influence the long term preservation of the site. Obtaining the Historic Texas Cemetery designation is a prerequisite for participation in the RIP Guardian program and we are thrilled that both Austin Memorial Park and Oakwood joined the statewide network.

The Board identified the following topics as those that are most important and also most likely to succeed and benefit SAC's mission of preservation and raising awareness:

Oakwood Chapel Restoration (Leslie Wolfenden)

Volunteers will work with the Steering Committee to implement the fund-raising campaign, including planning and hosting special events to raise awareness, garner community and political support, and recognize donors.

Membership Development (Susan Lassell)

Volunteers can help identify potential target groups to invite to join SAC, strategize on launching a membership campaign, and design literature for use in membership campaigns.

Social Media (Facebook and website updates) (Leslie Wolfenden)

Volunteers can help establish the driving "message" and protocols for moderating the SAC Facebook page, identify options for updating the look and feel of our website, and suggest other opportunities for maximizing the use of social media to get the word out about SAC's preservation and education efforts.

Public Information and Advertising (Susan Lassell)

Research (Danny Camacho)

Volunteers will assist with research for upcoming events, receive an orientation to repositories such as the Austin History Center with tips on research techniques, and provide their results either as organized documentation or fully developed tour narratives. Volunteers will prioritize these projects, coordinate with designers to help with graphic design, and strategize how to get the materials published on a non-profit budget.

Open House and Heritage Day Event (Leslie Wolfenden)

Volunteers will develop the concept for a collaborative event with local heritage groups such as the German-Texan Heritage Society, French Legation, Susannah Dickinson House Museum, with an Open House where we have demonstrations on how to properly clean headstones, how to document a cemetery, have guest speakers throughout the day, and have people share their personal family stories, photos, and documents, coordinate with affiliated organizations and experts, schedule the event for SAC's upcoming events calendar, and begin event planning tasks.
