January 2016 Speaker Event: If These Walls Could Talk by Kay Boyd

Save Austin's Cemeteries' January guest speaker session will be at the Yarborough Library located at 2200 Hancock Drive. The presentation will begin at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, January 9, 2016. Join us and learn more about the preservation efforts going on at the Sneed Mansion.

Bobby Cervantes will talk about his work in preservation. His current project is the Austin Historic Landmark Sneed Mansion built in the 1850s by Sebron G. Sneed. He will talk about the history of the place and what brought it to ruins. Bobby's preservation work has brought together many Sneed family members. The old house is located at 6305 Bluff Springs Drive, east of South IH 35. Many family members are buried in Oakwood Cemetery, while some of them are buried in two family cemeteries.


- SAC has worked hard for ten years with the City Staff, contractors, and master plan team to help craft the adopted Cemetery Master Plan and SAC will continue to monitor and assist with implementation and preservation projects. In many cases, we are representing common cemetery upkeep for families that have died off or families who no longer live in the area.
- We become a point of contact for families who are out of the area and who do not know who or how to contact the City of Austin Cemetery Division.
- The master plan will in the future require public bonds/CIP Capital Improvement Projects that have to be voted on and accepted by Austin taxpayers. With our free tours given several time a year and our public outreach programs like headstone cleaning, lot documenting, and guest speakers, we help reintroduce the city cemeteries to the public, tell your family stories, and impress upon the visitors that our public cemeteries are outdoor museums.
- The city has a research fee. We do not. In many cases, SAC volunteers help with photos and research. We also collect family stories and photographs, and we highlight these family stories though educational outreach programs that remind us that the City Cemeteries occupy an important place in Austin's heritage.

Assisting the Austin City Council by Dale Flatt

Several times a year, the city is contacted about an old forgotten cemetery that has become overgrown or is now an illegal dumpsite. Many city departments and our new council members have no idea how to proceed with citizens' concerns.

One of the long-term projects we at SAC have been working on, in coordination with the Austin Genealogy Society, Travis County Historical Commission, and the Texas Historical Commission, is to document all of the cemeteries in Travis County. SAC Past President Leslie Wolfenden worked with the City of Austin Council District maps and combined them with ongoing mapping and inventory lists to identify all of the cemeteries within each council district. We created packets of printed maps with a list for each district, along with electronic copies on CD. These packets were delivered to each city council member. We also included cemetery resources and SAC contact information. SAC is always ready, willing, and able to help organize a cleanup or to assist with an historic designation project. We currently have a few projects in the discovery phase. If you have an older cemetery in your neighborhood and you want to make a difference, we can help set you on the right path. Reach out to us — that's why we're here!

Austin Museum Day by Barbara Surles

The Austin Museum Partnership (AMP) celebrated its 18th annual Austin Museum Day on Sunday, September 15th. AMP promotes the day as a free, community-wide rediscovery of Austin Museums. For the 5th year in a row, Save Austin's Cemeteries joined the day of fun and enjoyed a small but pice turnout of curious visitors to Ockwood Cemeter.

Oakwood Cemetery Chapel Update by Leslie Wolfenden and Kevin Johnson

The Oakwood Cemetery Chapel was constructed in 1914 by prominent Austin architect, Charles H. Page. It sits within the Oakwood Cemetery, a City of Austin Historic Landmark, a registered Historic Texas Cemetery, and a National Register of Historic Places site. In the subsequent 100 years since its construction, the building has suffered from uneven foundation settlement and deferred maintenance. Under the 2012 Go Bond funding for Cemeteries, PARD will complete a full rehabilitation of this historically and architecturally significant structure.

Rehabilitation of the Chapel will include:

- Structural stabilization of foundation
- Surface drainage improvements
- ADA site access improvements, including creation of one parking space behind the chapel and new sidewalk
- Rehabilitation of single unisex restroom
- Mechanical, electrical, lighting overhaul
- Restoration of interior and exterior finishes, including doors, windows, masonry, roof, plaster, etc.

Hatch + Ulland, Owen Architects completed the final construction bidding documents in September. The





project was released for competitive bid by the COA Capital Contracting Office in October, and bidding will remain open until December 7th. The evaluation panel will conduct its evaluation prior to the end of the year. If necessary, interviews will take place early in 2016 prior to making a final contractor selection. Pending negotiations and council approval, construction could begin in Spring 2016 and should last approximately nine months.

Once restored, the building will be programmed in conjunction by PARD's Cemetery Operations and History, Arts and Nature Divisions as recommended by the COA Historic Cemeteries Master Plan.

Austin American Statesman Library Archive by Kay Boyd

Until recently the Austin American Statesman newspaper archives have not been available to researchers. The newspaper has been added to the ProQuest collection that is available through the Austin Public Library. Anyone with a library card to APL can log in and do name and subject searches and narrow the search down to the year and month they are seeking. At this point, you enter you library card account number.

For instance, a search for Oakwood brings up 13,330 entries. Narrowing the date down by using the side bar to 1930-1939 narrows the items down to 2,085. Then the year can be chosen with the decade and also the month. In September of 1936, there are now 29 results to choose from. A preview is available or you can bring up a full-text PDF of the article. The article can then be downloaded and printed. There are also other options to view the page.

This newspaper feature provides genealogists, researchers, and scholars with online, easily-searchable first-hand coverage of the society and events of the time.

The Portal to Texas History is still available to find information from newspapers across the state, as well as the oldest Austin newspapers, a few going back to 1829. Recent documents from the Travis County Archives of court records have been added to this database. http://texashistory.unt.edu/.


