Book Talk with Ed Crowell, Author of Barton Creek by Megan Spencer

Have you ever wondered where the crystal-clear waters of Barton Creek originate? That's what author Ed Crowell wanted to know. He spent two years walking the creek starting from where it empties into the Colorado River to its headwaters on private land northwest of Dripping Springs. It is about fifty circuitous miles from the headwaters of the creek to the Colorado. The book, *Barton Creek*, captures his experience. Ed and photographer, Alberto Martinez, joined us at Oakwood Chapel for a book talk on December 7, 2019.

Ed describes the geography and the political history of Barton Creek. He talked with many landowners who showed him their land bordering the creek and shared the



history of their place. Ed met scientists and conservationists who monitor the well-being of the salamanders living in Barton Springs and the aquifer. He walked through native habitats to see the environment of the Golden-cheeked Warbler and the Black-capped Vireo, both endangered species.

Emphasizing the importance of conserving Barton Creek, the book describes the conservation struggles of the 1980s, 1990s, and early 2000s when pollution of the creek's water caused by run-off from development, repeatedly closed Barton Springs Pool. If you lived here in the early 1990s, you might remember the Barton Springs "uprising" and an all-night City Council meeting with more than 800 citizens who signed up to speak about conserving the springs and the creek.

Robert Redford's grandparents lived in Austin and he stayed with them during summers when he was growing up. His grandparents introduced him to Barton Springs Pool when he was very young, and it is where he learned to swim. Redford returned to Austin in the 1990s and helped address the development happening over the aquifer which threatened Barton Springs. His film *The Unforseen* (2007) documents these conservation efforts.

Ed also addresses current environmental threats. Development continues in sensitive environments northwest of Dripping Springs and near Bee Cave. Thankfully, about fifty percent of Barton Creek is in land conservation. Families along Barton Creek, who own land passed down to them, are ardent conservationists.

There is an important burial site on private land (in conservation) owned by the Doerr family. Ed visited the gravesite and learned the sad story of an early Texas pioneer, Lorenzo D. Moore, who was probably the last man killed by Indians in Hays County. His small "dog trot" style home built in 1868 still stands. Lorenzo is buried in a private family cemetery nearby. His marker reads:

L.D. Moore Killed by Indians 1817 - 1872

Alberto's photos of the creek are stunning. There is a very fine hand-painted map of Barton Creek by Molly O'Halloran inside the book's front and back covers. If you missed Ed's talk, you can get a copy of his book at BookPeople. It is also available on Amazon.

Save Austin's Cemeteries helped Chapel staff research and present "To Elevate" on the legacy of Dr. Reuben Shannon Lovinggood and Huston-Tillotson University. The project republishes Dr. Arro Smith's research on African-American funeral homes and cemeteries.

On December 21, Danza Aztec Mexica performed a "Dance of the Four Corners" ceremony to remember the Tejanos and Mexican Americans buried at Oakwood. We also walked the perimeter of the Cemetery and read aloud the 900+ names of people with Mexican heritage buried here. In February, Mary Jane Aranda spoke about the traditions of Tamaladas in her family, and showed a tamale quilt she has been sewing.



Upcoming on March 7, Robert Ojeda and the Bronze Band

will perform traditional Mexican American music as a processional. Later that day, there will be an action of remembrance by Francisco Gonzalez, to be followed by screenings of films "Hundiré en el jardín mis manos" by Mayra Silva and "Building the American Dream" by Chelsea Hernandez.

Association for Gravestone Studies Annual Conference June 23-28 by Carlyn Hammons, Texas Historical Commission

Austin will host the Association for Gravestone Studies annual conference June 23-28. This is the first time the organization's conference will be held in Texas. The conference attracts attendees from around the world to discuss the study, documentation, and preservation of all things connected to cemetery and gravestone studies. Each June, enthusiasts join together for an enjoyable, informative and fun five days of learning and camaraderie. From breakfast discussions to late night presentations, the AGS annual conference is more than the typical scholarly meeting - it is an experience.

This should be wonderful opportunity for us to meet with and exchange ideas with people from all parts of the U.S. and beyond who are researching and preserving cemeteries. Typical attendees are cemetery managers,

conservators, historians, advocates, preservationists, students, and others who practice, research, and promote gravestone studies.

There will be variety of sessions, lectures, workshops, field sessions, and tours that address all aspects of gravestones, cemeteries, and other closely related topics—including preservation issues, carver studies, marker styles and motifs, burial practices, surveys, individual histories, etc. Wednesday field trips will feature numerous Austin cemeteries, while Saturday features two different bus tours—one to cemeteries in the Texas Hill Country, another to cemeteries in communities east of Austin. In addition, professional conservators will lead a twoday workshop on how to properly document, clean, repair, and reset stone grave markers.



Registration for the conference will open soon. In the meantime, a couple of deadlines to note:

- March 1 is the deadline to submit a session proposal. This is a great opportunity to show off your research and get feedback from others.
- March 31 is the deadline to apply for a generous student scholarship, which includes full conference registration, all meals, housing, and an extra \$200 cash prize. All graduate and undergraduate students at an accredited college or university are invited to submit a scholarship application.
